The past year was full of challenges, achievements and growth that we could have never envisioned. In 2018, we cut the ribbon on **HOPE Field Hospital for Women** which aids tremendously in our continued response to the near one million

Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazar accounting for one of the largest humanitarian crises in the world today.

HOPE treated 222,928 patients across our facilities in 2018, providing family planning services, primary healthcare, fistula repair surgeries, deliveries, and more. Our efforts are also continually focused on capacity building, and in that vein, **1,042 health professionals** were trained in Emergency Management and in Sexual and Reproductive Health throughout the year.

The year graduated a third batch of midwives, who are already hard at work helping women to deliver babies safely, actively reducing the c-section rate and the rate of maternal mortality throughout Bangladesh. We continued to work with **outstanding national and international volunteers** who truly make our work what it is.

I am incredibly honored to say that this year our Fistula Repair Program provided **100 fistula repair surgeries**, it is the highest number among all the institutions in the country.

HOPE Hospital



HOPE Hospital is our flagship facility, established in 2005. The hospital provides 24/7 safe pregnancy care. It is home to our fistula repair program and is the backbone of our extensive referral network. HOPE Hospital provides comprehensive Maternal Care, Pediatric Care, Physical Therapy, Burn Surgery, Fistula Surgery, Cleft Surgery and more.

HOPE Hospital is located in Ramu, Cox's Bazar, and is the first of many facilities which will make up the developing HOPE Foundation network of healthcare.

Obstetric Fistula Surgery Program

HOPE Foundation has a dedicated and intensive fistula team. As of December 2018 patients have undergone more than 450 surgeries denoting the highest success rate in the nation. Our devoted fistula team is specifically trained in screening and counselling, thus complementing our holistic approach to care. **Every woman suffering with this condition receives care free of cost in HOPE hospital through the support of Fistula Foundation.**

Village Approach

The biggest challenge for the HOPE Foundation fistula team remains the reluctance of women seeking care. Women of Bangladesh, for multiple reasons, such as fear, distrust and lack of education, do not seek treatment for obstetric fistula. As such, our team operates on a so-called "Village Approach." Our Team scours the community providing outreach and education in hopes of locating women in need of fistula repair surgery.

Cleft Program

Patient Story: Mohammed Ismail

Mohammed's parents felt a lot of pain after his birth revealed he suffered from cleft. They also felt shame socially, as neighbors would comment on his state. According to their view, babies with cleft lips are born as per will of God. However, Mohammed's mother began facing problems while breastfeeding.



He could not consume enough milk from his mother due to his cleft, most of the extracted milk came out through his nose. As a result he did not feel content regarding appetite. He used to cry all the time. At last they came to know about free treatment of HOPE Hospital from a government health worker. They received free treatment, medicine and food from HOPE Hospital. After successful operation on June 28, 2018 the grief of their mind flew away. They now feel confident about their son health. His family is grateful to HOPE Foundation.

Midwifery Training Program

A staggering 9 out of 10 women in southern parts of rural Bangladesh give birth at home, without access to trained medical care. If something goes wrong during labor, a woman is at critical risk for developing a serious injury, or death. This is one of the many reasons why it is so important to educate women and encourage them to seek safe deliveries and follow healthy practices.

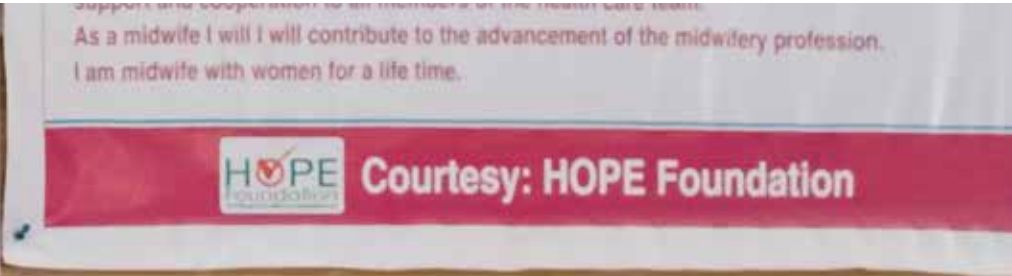
Through HOPE's 3-year community based midwifery program, in Cox's Bazar, midwives are trained in antenatal care, postnatal care, family planning, normal delivery, labs, fetal assessment, the signs of high risk and birth complications and the referral/diagnosis thereof. All of this made possible by the British Department for International Development (DFID) in partnership with BRAC University.

HOPE Outreach

All of HOPE's Programs require extensive outreach in order to create true, sustainable impact. HOPE's outreach activities are implemented through a variety of remote health clinics where access to care is otherwise limited.

Mobile Health Camps

Access to essential quality healthcare is a main pillar of our mission. HOPE continues to serve hard-to-reach, rural areas through our Mobile Medical Camps. The camps are of great benefit as they allow the doctors to locate patients with cleft lip, burns, or fistula patients and provide them with referrals to be treated at the appropriate HOPE facility.

Mothers' Clubs

Over 1,700 women have been reached through our 38 rural Mother's Clubs. The Club's main function is to educate, provide awareness, dispel myths and promote health among the most vulnerable women. Comprised of 30-50 mothers, these groups receive public health education and training by HOPE doctors and midwives, enabling them to share hygiene and sanitation practices and help to break down cultural barriers regarding healthcare within their community.

As a result, the mothers are also able to support our outreach initiatives by spreading health messages and making referrals that help us to provide care to mothers who otherwise would not know of our services.

Rural Birth Centers

90% of women living in rural areas of Bangladesh receive no skilled healthcare treatment. HOPE's birth centers are staffed by skilled midwives that provide family planning, prenatal and postnatal care to women who are most in need. The midwives, trained in HOPE's midwifery program, provide skilled healthcare to women living in these rural areas and are able to refer high risk pregnancies to HOPE Hospital. Because of this, our rural birth centers are saving lives every day.

Patient Story

I came to HOPE Field Hospital because my water broke and I was in labor. I came previously, but the midwife checked me and told me I was not ready, although the baby would come soon. She gave me great advice, and taught me everything to watch for so that I would know when I was ready to give birth to my first baby.

I am Bengali. I am not Rohingya, but I knew that **I would receive the best care here**. My family and friends advised me to come here because they were sure I would get good treatment and that the doctors and midwives that work here are kind.

I trusted in them, and because I wanted to have a healthy baby, I chose to come to HOPE. Now that we have our healthy baby, the most important thing for my husband and I is to be able to give our baby an education.

The Rohingya Refugee Crisis

Beginning in August 2017, devastating violence in Myanmar's Rakhine State began forcibly displacing Rohingya Muslims from their homeland into southern Bangladesh by the hundreds of thousands.

The once rather rural area in Cox's Bazar, known as Ukhiya has now been deemed one of the most densely populated areas of the world. Near one million Rohingya occupy temporary shelters throughout the area. Victims of an ethnic cleansing, the Rohingya population have suffered grave abuse including rape, starvation and torture. Excluded from citizenship since the passing of a so-called "citizenship law" in 1982, they are stateless and the number arrived in Bangladesh accounts for one of the largest humanitarian crises in the world today.

The refugee population in Cox's Bazar, and the surrounding community face great risk of disease

outbreak due to overcrowding. In addition to the already dire situations the Rohingya face, many of the majority women refugees, arrive pregnant or have lost children due to persecution as a result of the ongoing conflict.

The HOPE Foundation team works tirelessly to provide lifesaving care to these women and their families through the following facilities and programs:

- **HOPE Field Hospital for Women**
- **One Primary Healthcare Center**
- **Eight (8) around the clock Sexual and Reproductive Health Centers**
- **Training Program on Emergencies**
- **HOPE Emergency Transportation System**
- **HOPE Emergency Response Team**
- **Hosting international volunteers and surgical missions**
- **Community awareness programs**

From the outset of the crisis in August 2017, we have treated a total of **316,362 Rohingya patients.**



HOPE Field Hospital for Women

In 2018, facilitating our response to the Rohingya crisis, we opened the doors of **HOPE Field Hospital for Women**. Our hospital is strategically located inside of one of the largest Rohingya camps, Camp 4. The 24/7 facility is the only field hospital in the camps focused on maternity care. Our hospital is one of few inpatient facilities operating in the area.

SOLAR CLINICS

The field hospital also hosts our climate-friendly, Solar Clinics. The German-made Solar Clinics house our field hospitals' newborn care, pharmacy, labs, maternity care, sterilization unit and procedure rooms. The five solar clinics are donated by Abundant Future Foundation of California, USA.



EMERGENCY TRANSPORTATION

HOPE Foundation has a large transportation network with 20 TOMTOMs and 4 ambulances operating 24/7. The emergency transportation services provide life saving referral for thousands of patients for the Rohingya Refugee community and host community of Cox's Bazar.

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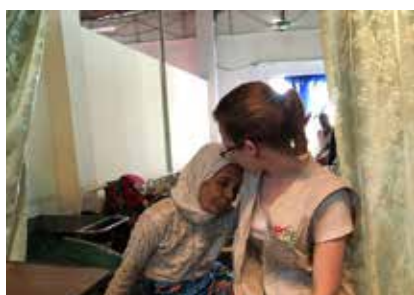
